We are presenting the key Acts of Parliament, resolutions, and decisions enacted as of September 8, 2026. Please note that this newsletter reflects the date on which the relevant legal information was registered in the unified legal information system, and that the date on which the legal act concerned was actually adopted may differ from this date.

I. LEGISLATION:

1.1 Agriculture Act

The Agriculture Act, consisting of 6 chapters and 20 sections, was enacted during the plenary session of the State Great Khural on June 19, 2026. The Act regulates relations relating to the principles to be upheld by the State with respect to agriculture, the types and specialization of agricultural production, agricultural zoning, the supply chain for agricultural raw materials and products, the priority directions of, and operating principles applicable to, sustainable agricultural policy, risk and its assessment and management, the support for and protection of agricultural production and markets, and the functions, coordination, registration and supervision of the entities responsible for the management and implementation of agricultural production activities.

1.2 State and Local Property-Owned Company Governance Act

Relations involving state- and locally-owned companies have previously been regulated under the State and Local Property Act, the Companies Act, and other related legislation. However, the State and Local Property Act did not precisely define the concept of a “state- or locally-owned company,” and, in addition, such companies have been established with organizational structures and legal forms other than those specified in the Civil Code, which has rendered the governance and regulation of such legal entities unclear.

Accordingly, a need arose to clarify the concept of a state- or locally-owned company and the grounds, requirements and criteria for establishing one, to reform the practice of establishing state- and locally-owned companies without adequate study or

justification, and to fully regulate, in accordance with the Legislation Act, the matters falling within the social relations to be governed by such an act.

For this reason, the State and Local Property-Owned Company Governance Act, consisting of 10 chapters and 51 sections, was enacted during the plenary session of the State Great Khural on July 2, 2026. The Act regulates relations relating to the grounds and procedure for establishing state- and locally-owned companies, their classification, the principles to be upheld in company operations, supervision, management and organization, and the exercise of shareholder rights with respect to state- and local-property shareholdings, with the aim of improving sound corporate governance and transparency and increasing financial efficiency and returns.

1.3 Family Act (Revised Edition)

During the plenary session of the State Great Khural on July 3, 2026, the revised edition of the Family Act, consisting of 11 chapters and 86 sections, was enacted.

The revised edition places greater emphasis on protecting the rights and legitimate interests of children, and introduces new regulations, including provisions protecting the rights and legitimate interests of children born to minor parents, defining the rights and obligations of a parent living separately from a child, restricting a parent's authority in connection with the disposal of property allotted to a child, and ensuring a child's right to maintain contact with relatives.

In addition, in order to legally regulate new issues arising in contemporary family relations, new provisions have been introduced, including provisions on entering into marriage contracts, determining the parents of a child born as a result of the use of assisted reproductive technology, and determining the legislation applicable to family relations of an international character.

As such, compared to the Family Act enacted in 1999, the revised edition is notable for its stronger

focus on protecting the rights and interests of children and on legally regulating new forms of contemporary family relations.

II. STATE GREAT KHURAL: NOTABLE RESOLUTION

2.1 On Matters to Be Discussed at the 2026 Autumn Regular Session of the State Great Khural of Mongolia

At the 2026 autumn regular session of the State Great Khural of Mongolia, a total of 35 bills and draft resolutions are scheduled for discussion, including the bill on amendments and additions to the General Education Act, the bill on amendments to the Political Parties Act, the bill on additions to the Banking Act, and the bill on the Constitutional Court of Mongolia Act.

III. INTERNATIONAL TREATIES

3.1 On the Ratification of Loan and Project Agreements

Upon submission by the Government of Mongolia, the State Great Khural has ratified the loan and project agreement for “Phase III of the Project for Improving the Efficiency of the Central Region Electricity Transmission and Distribution Network,” entered into between Mongolia and KfW (Kreditanstalt für Wiederaufbau), the reconstruction loan bank of the Federal Republic of Germany, on June 10, 2026, as well as the loan agreement for the “Energy 4 Project,” entered into between Mongolia and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development on May 8, 2026.
